

## Reflecting On 2021

We're now three years into COVID-19– a global pandemic that has brought supply chains to a halt, closed classroom doors for months on end, and seen families and communities devastated by illness and loss. When disasters hit—whether they're health, environmental or conflict driven—it's those who are already vulnerable that suffer the most. The UN estimates that over 150 million people have been pushed into extreme poverty because of COVID.

Yet through it all, God is faithful and continues to provide for his people. In the past year, we've seen extraordinary responses from our faithful supporters, creative program adaptions from our local Christian Partners, and ongoing resourcing for urgent humanitarian needs in areas like Papua New Guinea, Indonesia, South Asia and Afghanistan.



We continue to dream of and work towards a world where poverty has ended and all people enjoy the fullness of life God intends. Until that day, we give thanks to God for the work he calls us to and for those he calls to partner with us, like Crossway Baptist Church.

# What's Been Happening In Bangladesh?

COVID has put increasing pressure on Bangladesh's health system, particularly in rural areas with poorly resourced health facilities. Just under half of the population are now fully vaccinated for COVID¹. The pandemic has also had a social and economic toll, pushing 24.5 million people into poverty. Schoolaged children have missed important time in the classroom, parents have lost their sources of income, and the fear of getting sick has spread throughout communities.

Building relationships between the community, our local Christian Partners and local government bodies is a core element of all Baptist World Aid community development programs. When members of the community trust each other and our local Christian Partner staff, opportunities for change arise

Thankfully, our local Christian Partners in Bangladesh adapt to the challenges they face and the ways they engage with the community —especially during lockdown— so they can maintain these relationships. Last year they used technology and social media to connect regularly with the community. When possible, they held small group meetings where social distancing and mask-wearing were required.

## **Highlights To Celebrate!**

#### PLEASE SHARE THESE HIGHLIGHTS WITH YOUR CHURCH FAMILY!

#### 2021 saw several highlights, including:

- Eight community groups are now self-operational and equipped with skills and experience.
  This means they can provide ongoing support to their community even though our Local
  Partner is phasing out of this area. Over 120 community leaders have grown stronger in
  their strategic planning, budgeting, advocating, networking and relationship building skills
  through our project activities.
- Over 200 community leaders and disaster management committee members were trained on early warnings for disasters, how to reduce their risks from future disasters, and how to establish disaster response plans.
- Over 130 children living with disabilities received help in applying for and accessing government financial support.
- In the second year of a nine-year project in central Bangladesh, many community groups
  were established—including savings groups, child and youth clubs and village development
  forums. Despite the challenges of large gatherings, these groups still received training in
  child rights, record keeping and leadership to begin building their capacity.
- 40 women participated in sewing training, equipping them with skills for income generation.
- An Emergency Response Team was established in the project area in south-west Bangladesh. This team worked together when Cyclone Yash hit Bangladesh in mid-May 2021. They provided early warnings to their local community and conducted a post-cyclone survey to identify the damage that would need addressing.
- 12 hand washing stations were installed in community meeting spots and personal protection equipment (such as soap, sanitiser and masks) was distributed via local community groups to help keep the community safe from viruses like COVID.

# SOLAR POWERED HARVEST

Farmers in our project area in South-West Bangladesh now have access to year-long water to irrigate their farms thanks to solar panel pumps that our local Christian Partner helped them install. With the additional water supplies, these farmers are now protected against heat waves and drought.

'Previously I could produce around 1,000kg of rice in one harvest. Now I'm producing around 1,900kg of rice from just one round of cultivation,' farmer Sudeb said.
